

Vaccinations

<b>Young Horses</b>	Broodmares should be vaccinated 4-6 weeks before foaling date. Foals will receive first vaccinations at 4-6 months old, but may need vaccinations as early as one month if the mare was not vaccinated.
<b>Adult Horses</b>	Most vaccines are annual. Consult your vet for information on which vaccinations are necessary for your horse.
<b>Senior Horses</b>	Continue annual vaccinations, but watch for adverse reactions.

Coggins Test	
<b>Young Horses</b>	Tests will not be accurate until foals are 6 months of age. After that, they should be tested annually.
<b>Adult Horses</b>	Typically recommended annually, but regulations vary by state. Horses that travel frequently may be required to be tested within 60 days of interstate travel.
<b>Senior Horses</b>	Annual for most horses. Biannual testing may be sufficient for horses kept at low-traffic stables.

Deworming

<b>Young Horses</b>	Start at 4-6 months. Not all dewormers are safe for foals. Contact your vet before initiating a deworming program.
<b>Adult Horses</b>	Deworm bimonthly, rotating chemical classes as appropriate for your climate.
<b>Senior Horses</b>	Continue a regular deworming schedule.

Dentistry	
<b>Young Horses</b>	First exam should take place within the first few days of life. Continue dental exams every six months until the adult teeth grow in around age five. This will help find any potential problems before they occur.
<b>Adult Horses</b>	Exam and floating annually.
<b>Senior Horses</b>	Older horses are prone to dental problems. Schedule exams every six months with floatings when necessary.

Farrier	
<b>Young Horses</b>	First visit should take place at 1-3 months of age.
<b>Adult Horses</b>	Farrier visits every 6-8 weeks.
<b>Senior Horses</b>	Continue regular farrier visits and monitor horse for decrease in hoof quality.
